

Your prep child brought home an envelope 2 weeks ago with some information regarding the Victorian Primary School Nursing Program.


This Nursing Program is a free health assessment service offered by the Department of Education and Training to all children during their first year of primary school.

NAPLAN

Students in Grade 3 and Grade 5 only will participate in the NAPLAN Online testing from Wednesday the 12th of March to Friday the 21st of March 2025.

The National Assessment Program – Literacy and Numeracy (NAPLAN) assesses literacy and numeracy

skills that are essential for every child to progress through school and life. Students participate in the annual NAPLAN tests in reading, writing, language conventions (spelling, grammar, and punctuation) and numeracy.

If your child must be absent due to illness or an unavoidable issue, parents/carers are requested to enter this information on Compass or by contacting the office staff who can record this information on your behalf. Our office staff check the student non-attendance list

daily and will attempt to contact families as soon as practicable on the same day of any student's unexplained absence.

Going to school every day is the single most important part of your child's education. Students learn new things at school every day – missing school puts them behind.

School is better when your child is there!

Why it's important - We all want our students to get a great education, and the building blocks for a great education begin with students coming to school every day. If students miss school regularly, they miss out on learning the fundamental skills that will set them up for success in the later years of school.

There is no safe number of days for missing school – each day a student misses puts them behind and can affect their educational outcomes. Each missed day is associated with progressively lower achievement in numeracy, writing and reading.


Where possible, school staff will work with you to ensure that your concerns are appropriately addressed. Remember...Always see the classroom teacher first.

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

Parent/ Teacher/ Student Conferences are a valuable and important part of our assessment and reporting cycle every year. In 2025, we are conducting Parent Teacher Student Conferences in Terms 1 and 3 and written student reports are provided at the end of Term 2 and 4. This allows parents and carers to have regular feedback on their child's progress in learning and provides an important time to share information from home, to help teachers develop an understanding of their child's individual needs.



The Parent/ Teacher/ Student Conferences are now open on Compass, so please book in to meet your child's teacher/s, with time slots available between 11.00am and 7.45pm.

To make a booking, you will need to:

- Login using your parent login credentials.
- From the 'Home' page you may see a Dashboard notification letting you know that Conferences are open for booking.
- Select 'Click here for booking' to be taken to the main Conferences page.

You can also access Conference booking by clicking the 'More' menu in the navigation bar and then selecting 'Conferences' from the menu tiles.

If you have any concerns or need assistance booking, please speak to our office staff. Interpreters can be booked for many different languages, so please indicate if you need an interpreter. If your language is not listed on Compass, please contact the office on 9465 4922, so we can attempt to locate an interpreter for you.

<u>Optional</u> Conferences are available with your child's specialist teacher in PE, Art, Italian and STEAM, as you may need to discuss concerns or progress. Specialist teachers may teach over 300 students at the school, so they will not be available to meet with all parents on this day. Each Specialist will have only 30 interview time slots available to the first families who make a booking.

Please note: Tuesday the 11th of March is not a regular school day. Students do not attend school but come with their parent/s or carer/s for their Conference only. Students are to wear their school uniform for their conference.

Bookings will close on Thursday the 6th of March at 8.30am.

Celebration of International Mother Language Day

Languages are essential to education and sustainable development, serving as the primary means through which knowledge is transferred, and cultures are preserved. With approximately 8,324 languages in the world today, many are at risk of disappearing due to globalisation and societal changes. Ensuring that education systems support the right to learn in one's mother tongue is crucial for improving learning outcomes, as students who are taught in a language, they fully understand and show better comprehension, engagement, and critical thinking skills. Multilingual education, particularly for minority and indigenous languages, not only helps learners but also fosters a deeper connection between education and culture, contributing to more inclusive and equitable societies.

The 25th anniversary of International Mother Language Day celebrates a quarter-century of efforts to preserve linguistic diversity and promote mother tongues. This milestone emphasizes the importance of language preservation in safeguarding cultural heritage, improving education, and fostering more peaceful societies.

Safeguarding Linguistic Diversity

Languages, with their complex implications for identity, communication, social integration, education and development, are of strategic importance for people and the planet. Yet, due to globalization processes, they are increasingly under threat or disappearing altogether. When languages fade, so does the world's rich tapestry of cultural diversity. Opportunities, traditions, memory, unique modes of thinking and expression — valuable resources for ensuring a better future — are also lost.

Every two weeks a language disappears taking with it an entire cultural and intellectual heritage. UNESCO estimates that there are 8,324 languages, spoken or signed. Out of these, around 7,000 languages are still in use. Only a few hundred languages have genuinely been given a place in education systems and the public domain, and less than a hundred are used in the digital world.

Multilingual and multicultural societies exist through their languages, which transmit and preserve traditional knowledge and cultures in a sustainable way.



SPEECH BOX

HOW ORAL LANGUAGE SUPPORTS EMOTIONAL WELLBEING



Research shows that children with stronger language skills in Year 1 are more likely to develop better emotional regulation by Year 6. This means that building your child's language skills from an early age can help them manage their emotions, navigate challenges, and develop resilience.

Talking about past experiences, future events, and emotions helps children develop vocabulary and thinking skills needed to understand their feelings and the feelings of others. These conversations also help children make sense of the world, reflect on their experiences, and build resilience by learning how to express and process emotions.



Self-talk-the internal dialogue we all have-also plays an important role in emotional regulation. Children with strong language skills are better equipped to use self-talk to calm themselves, think through challenges, and problem-solve when faced with difficult situations

You can help strengthen your child's language and emotional skills through simple, everyday interactions:

- Explain how and why things happen e.g., "We need to leave now because your brother isn't feeling well."
- Make connections to past experiences e.g., "We're flying to visit Aunt Kate. Remember when we took a plane to Sydney last year?"
- Encourage your child to predict what might happen e.g., "I wonder what games they'll play at the birthday party?"
- · Brainstorm solutions to problems together e.g., "Oh no, we ran out of bread. What else could we use for a sandwich?"
- Talk about emotions-yours and theirs e.g., "I'm feeling a little sad today because I miss Grandad."
- Help your child understand other people's feelings e.g., 'I think that boy is upset because someone took his toy."

Camps, Sports and Excursions fund eligibility (CSEF)

Below are the criteria used to determine a student's eligibility for the Camps, Sports and Excursions Fund (CSEF).



Criteria 1 – Eligibility

To be eligible* for the fund, a mature minor of sixteen years of age or over, a parent or legal guardian of a student attending a registered Government or non-government Victorian primary or secondary school must:

- on the first day of Term one; or
- on the first day of Term two.
- a) Be an eligible beneficiary within the meaning of the State Concessions Act 2004, that is, be a holder of Veterans Affairs Gold Card or be an eligible Centrelink Health Care Card (HCC) or Pensioner Concession Card (PCC) holder; or
- b) Be a temporary foster parent; and
- c) Submit an application to the school by the due date.

* A special consideration eligibility category also exists. For more information, see: <u>Camps, Sports and Excursions Fund (CSEF): Eligibility</u> <u>education.vic.gov.au</u>

Mature minors or parents who receive a Carer Allowance on behalf of a child, or any other benefit or allowance not income tested by Centrelink, are not eligible for the CSEF unless they also comply with one of (a) or (b) above.

Criteria 2 - Be of school age and attend school in Victoria

School is compulsory for all Victorian children aged between six and seventeen years of age inclusive.

For the purposes of CSEF, students may be eligible for assistance if they attend a Victorian registered primary or secondary school. Typically, these students are aged between five and eighteen years inclusive.

CSEF is not payable to students' attending pre-school, kindergarten, home schooling, or TAFE.

Eligibility Date

For concession card holders, CSEF eligibility will be subject to the parent/legal guardian's concession card being successfully validated with Centrelink (see <u>Camps, Sports and Excursions Fund (CSEF): Policy | education.vic.gov.au</u>).

Payment amounts

CSEF payment amount

The CSEF is an annual payment to the school to be used towards camps, sports and/or excursion expenses for the benefit of the eligible student.

The CSEF is paid directly the school and will be allocated by the school towards camps, sports and/or excursion costs for your child. Please refer to the policy for the current rates.

For ungraded students, the rate payable is determined by the student's date of birth. For more information, see: <u>Camps, Sports and</u> <u>Excursions Fund (CSEF): Payment amounts | education.vic.gov.au</u>

Foundation and Year 7 government school students who are CSEF recipients are also eligible for a uniform voucher. Schools are required to make applications on behalf of parents, so please register your interest at the school.

How to complete the application form

NOTE: ALL SECTIONS MUST BE COMPLETED BY PARENT/LEGAL GUARDIAN

- Complete the PARENT/LEGAL GUARDIAN DETAILS section. Make sure that the Surname, First Name, and Customer Reference Number (CRN) details match those on your concession card. You will also need to provide your concession card to the school.
 If you are claiming as a Foster Parent or a Veteran Affairs Pensioner, you will need to provide a copy of documentation confirming your status as a temporary Foster Parent or provide your Veterans Affairs Pensioner Gold card to the school.
- 2. Complete the STUDENT/S DETAILS section for students at this school.
- 3. Sign and date the form and return it to the school office as soon as possible.

CSEF payments cannot be claimed retrospectively for prior years.

Queries relating to CSEF eligibility and payments should be directed to the school.





Understanding phonics: a helpful guide for families, parents and carers

Reading is a foundational life skill and a source of pleasure and wonder.

It is one of the most important skills children learn and the teaching of **phonics** plays an important role in helping them become confident, fluent readers.

This guide will help you understand what phonics is, why it is important in learning to read, and how children can be supported at home to develop their awareness of sounds, and of the relationships between sounds and letters.

What is phonics?

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Phonics includes linking sounds (called 'phonemes') to their corresponding letters (called 'graphemes'). Students read words by recognising the relationships between written symbols and their corresponding sounds.

Phonics is one of 6 components that make up a comprehensive reading program.

Oral language	Knowing and using spoken words to express knowledge, ideas and emotions
Phonemic awareness	The knowledge of sounds (phonemes)
Vocabulary	Understanding words in isolation and in context
Fluency	Reading accurately and at an appropriate rate with expression
Comprehension	Making meaning from text which includes developing knowledge of grammar

These are the foundational skills that have a reciprocal relationship and are all necessary to enable students to independently read and respond to increasingly complex fiction and non-fiction texts.

Why is phonics instruction important?

Research and evidence show that phonics instruction is a highly effective way to teach children to read. It helps them develop **decoding skills** (translating printed words into speech), which assist in reading unfamiliar words. Phonics gives many children the tools to figure out new words and understand spelling patterns, building their reading fluency and comprehension.

How is phonics taught in schools?

The key elements of phonics are:

- 1. Phonemes: the smallest units of sound in speech (e.g, the sound /k/ in 'cat').
- Graphemes: the letters, or groups of letters, that represent these sounds (e.g., the letter 'c' in 'cat').
- Blending: combining individual sounds together to read a word (e.g., /c/ /a/ /t/ = 'cat').
- Segmenting: breaking down words into their individual sounds to spell them (eg., chat = /ch/a/t).

Phonics is taught through a structured, sequential approach where children learn the simplest sounds (such as /s/,/a/, and /t/ and gradually move to more complex sound-letter patterns (such as /ee/, as in the sound in the word 'bee' and /oa/ as in the sound in the word 'cloak'. This is known as teaching **using a systematic, synthetic phonics** approach. In simple terms, children learn different sounds, then practice blending sounds together to read words.




